[Public Health Research Day](#) is an annual conference hosted by the Brown University School of Public Health that highlights the research accomplishments of our students, trainees and partners. This is a signature event celebrated each year during National Public Health Week. In 2026 NPHW is April 6-12.

**This year's Public Health Research Day will be held on April 7, 2026.** This in-person event will be at Alumnae Hall, 194 Meeting St, Providence, RI 02906. The conference will open to the community at 1:00 pm, and posters will be on display until 3:30 pm. We invite our Brown University and School of Public Health community members to attend and discuss the research posters with the presenters. Refreshments will be served throughout.

**Our Call for Abstracts will be open from February 20th through March 2nd, 2026 (11:59pm).** The application link will be [active on our website](#) on the 20th. Scientific research abstracts are welcome from our public health undergraduate and master's thesis students, and our doctoral and postdoctoral trainees. We also invite a select number of posters from our community research and state agency partners, such as our RIDOH colleagues publicizing surveillance datasets and analyses. Staff are welcome to participate in other events, such as the [CAAS Staff Research Day](#) event on February 27, 2026.

## Save these Dates!

- **Abstracts will be accepted from February 20th until March 2nd, 2026.**
  - Student applicants will receive one round of feedback from a faculty reviewer by March 20th.
  - Reviewer feedback is helpful, but is limited to a few suggestions, such as asking for additional specificity in your methods or clarity in your results.
  - We suggest you start your poster well ahead of these deadlines to allow time for your thesis advisors/PIs to approve the poster. Reviewer feedback is often easy to incorporate into a near-final poster.
- **Posters will be due on March 24th, 2026.**
  - All SPH applicants are asked to use [the 2026 PHRD poster template](#). Applicants will submit their poster as a .pdf. Due to space concerns, all presenters must use this template.
  - All State agency and community research partners are asked to [visit this page for instructions](#).
  - Printing and poster setup are provided by the Office of Education; instructions on how to submit a poster will be sent when you submit your abstract.

- **Applicants will present their posters in person on April 7, 2026, from 1:00 - 3:30 pm.**
  - At least one faculty judge will visit you during this time, so please make every effort to attend the entire event. Remote presentation options are not an option at this venue.
  - Prizes will be awarded in April in the following categories: 1) Undergraduate, 2) Master's, and 3) Doctoral/Postdoctoral trainees.


## Instructions for your Research Abstract and Poster

### Instructions for submitting your abstract application form:

1. You will be asked to include the following details in your application:
  - a. *Your name, degree program, or department*
  - b. *Study title*
  - c. *Overview/Research Question (separate response in application)*
  - d. *IRB approval information for human subjects research*
2. Please include the following headings in the body of your abstract:
  - a. *Background & Aims*
  - b. *Methods*
  - c. *Results*
  - d. *Conclusions*
3. The abstract should be 400 words or less (excluding title, authors, etc);
